NEW CURBSIDE TRASH COLLECTION

The week of April 1, 2024 the new curbside collection changes will be implemented for all residential homes 2 units or less.

The service being provided will be fully automated. This means the truck will pull up to your container, lift the container and place it back down in the same location. Multiple containers must be placed next to each other at least (6) six inches apart.

Most everyone has received their new container, we are still awaiting some. If you have not received your 32 gallon container, please note it will be arriving soon. If you do not have it by trash day next week, please utilize your old container, or leave your bags at the curbside and a separate truck will be by those homes to collect the trash.

All trash containers come with a serial number to identify ownership, no registration required, they have been logged as the containers have been delivered. If you want your address on the container, please use mailbox stickers, do not spray paint the container.

All trash must be contained within the confines of the trash container. There will be no bags collected that are left outside of the container(s), as well as no bags, boxes or other debris stacked on top of the container. If this occurs, Casella will have to leave the container as is and will be back the following week to collect, if corrected.



PAY AS YOU THROW

The PAYT program changed a few months ago. If you have access trash beyond your allowable curbside containers you can bring any size back to the Transfer Station and drop it off for \$5.00 each. No special bags needed, only household trash is acceptable. Please rinse out your containers and bring them down during normal business hours. Tues & Sat 8am-3pm

RECYCLING CENTER

A great way to save on space in your curbside containers and produce less costly tonnage is the recycle. The Recycling Center accept plastics 1-7 unsorted, no black, no caps, corrugated cardboard (brown cardboard), tin, aluminum, glass and metal. Please rinse out your containers and bring them down during normal business hours. Tues & Sat 8am-3pm

Ongoing scams involving requests for payments involving gift cards or Green Dot cards. The IRS, law enforcement, and any other government agencies do not require payment using gift cards or Green Dot cards. Common scams involve groups claiming to be from the IRS or some other law enforcement agency claiming you need to pay a fine to clear a warrant using gift cards, Green Dot cards, or similar instruments. If you are threatened with arrest or a warrant unless you pay, assume it is a scam and contact the Northfield Police Department.



PUBLIC WORKS DEPT

Pothole season is upon us. The Public Works Department, like most departments throughout New England, will be working hard on road repairs as they come up. With the asphalt plants still closed most pot hole repairs will be temporary. Please use caution on all roads, drive slow, avoid large puddles, and if you see a pot hole, please take the time to go around it. We appreciate your patience as we continue to make the roads safer and easier to travel.

Gravel roads have been posted with a 6 ton weight restriction and asphalt roads have been posted with a 12 ton weight restriction. When planning for a delivery to your property such as fuel, household furnishing & appliances, etc. Please let the delivery companies know about road postings, and if at all possible, to make the delivery first thing in the morning while ground is still frozen. Additionally, when needed we do offer waivers, applications can be found on the Town's website www.northfieldnh.org

Castor Canadensis

Description: The beaver is the largest North American rodent, ranging in weight from 30-100 pounds. Their large webbed hind feet are adapted for swimming, and their broad, flat, leathery tail serves as a rudder and propeller. Although their ears are small, beavers have excellent hearing. Beavers close their ears and nostrils while under water. Beaver teeth, including their bright orange incisors, grow continuously.

Range and Distribution: Beaver occur across most of North America except on the peninsula of Florida, on the Arctic tundra, and in southwestern deserts. Trapping nearly eliminated beaver from New Hampshire by the late 1800's. Six beaver were released in the state between 1926 and 1930 as part of a restocking program. By 1955, the entire state was repopulated. Their numbers continue to increase locally throughout New England.

Habits and Habitat: Beavers are true vegetarians, eating leaves, bark, twigs, sprouts, fruits and buds of shrubs and trees, as well as aquatic plants such as sedges and rushes. Preferred woody plants include alder, aspen, birch, maple



and willow. Small diameter stems (<3") are most heavily sought. Beavers typically feed within 100 yards of the edge of a pond. When beaver start gnawing on larger softwoods and less favorable hardwoods, or travel long distances to feed, it is indicative of a dwindling food supply. About 200 aspens support one beaver for one year.

Beaver cache food for the winter, submerging tree and shrub branches next to their lodge. Beavers are usually nocturnal but they may be seen at dawn and dusk making repairs to their lodge or dam or gathering food. Beavers live in colonies which usually consists of an adult pair, the young of the year (kits), and the young of the previous year (yearlings). The number of beavers in a colony is usually five or six, but can be 12 or more. Two-year-olds leave the colony in late spring to establish new colonies of their own.

Beavers are highly territorial. A colony marks its territory, using scent mounds, preventing other beavers from colonizing the area. They construct a large mound where scent is deposited or they deposit scent on small piles of mud carried from the stream bottom to the territory boundary. The territory of a beaver colony extends about 0.5 miles along a waterway.

Beavers are monogamous and pair for life. Breeding occurs in winter with 3-5 kits born in May or June. Litter size may vary with the quantity and quality of food supply. Beaver do not breed until their second or third year. Older females (5 to 13 year olds) produce more offspring.

Beavers dam small to large slowly flowing brooks, streams, or rivers, usually bordered by woodlands. After beavers complete the dam, they construct a lodge in the deepest portion of the pond. If a stream is too large for a beaver to dam, they will build dens or lodges along the banks. An adequate food supply is essential for beaver colonization. Beaver will colonize an area, build a series of dams and lodges, harvest small trees within reach of the impoundment, then move on when food resources are depleted. An abandoned beaver pond will eventually return to the early successional stage of a brook and meadow. Beaver flowages are important habitat for many other species including great blue herons, osprey, kingfisher, mink, otter and muskrat.

Management: Management activities that encourage beaver also can improve waterfowl habitat, particularly for black and wood ducks. Patch cuts around mature aspen and birch near the edge of a wetland can regenerate food supplies and encourage beaver to return. The installation of beaver pipes is an effective way to control water levels and keep beaver from flooding valuable timber stands, roads, and other areas.


