ROAD WORK

Expect Delays as roads may be down to one lane at times.

State of NH DOT had some delays this week for Park St. They expect to complete all the catch basins and drainage issues next week and plan to start grinding from the Legion to Cottage on Friday. Once completed they will pave from the Legion into Canterbury.

Winter binder Paving of the following roads is scheduled to start mid Sept ...

- Shaker Rd – from Fiske Rd to Twin Bridge Rd
- Bay Hill – from top of the hill to the 4 corners
- Keasor Rd – from end of new pavement to Turnpike Rd / Reservoir Rd.

Please look for signs, flaggers, and as always use caution in and around work zones.

Residents of Northfield

- **Mailbox- US Postal Service instructions are as follows:**
 1. Whenever possible, boxes must be located so that carrier's vehicle is off pavement when servicing them.
 2. Approach to box should be a hard level surface (gravel, cinders, stone).
 3. Boxes must be placed to conform to state laws and highway regulations.
 4. Extend box beyond end of post. Attach board holding box to post with screws or double head nails, permitting easy removal if necessary to adjust box height.
- **Mailbox- Town of Northfield instructions are as follows:**
 1. Homeowners erecting a mailbox or post in the public right of way shall position the post at least 4 feet back from traveled portion of the right of way.
 2. Position the mailbox 42 inches above the ground.
 3. Ensure that the mailbox and post are constructed to withstand being hit by snow discharged by snow removal equipment.
 4. Landowner is totally responsible for the shoulder in front of their mailbox, and can consult the Public Works Director if questions arise.
- **Damage resulting from discharged snow:**
 1. The Town is not responsible for mailbox damage from snow being discharged by snow removal equipment.
 2. Damage to a mailbox or post by town owned equipment will be assessed by the Public Works Director to determined fault (operator error or mailbox location).
- **Deposit of Materials in Road:**
 1. It shall be a violation of the Highway Ordinance for any person to deposit or cause to be deposited any material within the boundaries of the Town roads, drainage ditches, right of ways, sidewalks or any other Town owned or maintained parcel in such a manner so as to obstruct their use, create a hazardous travel condition or impede the line of sight for either pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
 2. This deposited material (snow) should not be left in the public right of way, or across the road in the ditch to cause the ditch to freeze and alter the flow of drainage.
 3. Brush, leaves, dead or decayed trees in the right of way or drainage ditches is the responsibility of the landowner.
- **Driveway connections, or curb cuts: RSA 236:13, VI**
 1. Driveway connections including structures like culverts, Remain the continuing responsibility of the landowner- even if located within the right of way. If the driveway connection threatens the integrity of the highway due to plugged culverts, erosion, siltation, etc. the planning board or its designee can require the owner to repair it. If the owner refuses to effectuate such repairs, then the town may perform the work and assess the costs to the owner.
- **Trees in the Right of Way:**
 1. Trees in the right of way are owned by the landowners. Trees that are leaning toward power lines please call the utility company and notify them.
 2. Trees that are dead, or leaning toward the road are the landowner's responsibility. When the tree falls into the road, the highway crew will in most circumstances cut and push it back onto the property it originated from, out of the drainage ditch.

BUDGET COMMITTEE: Members of Northfield's Budget Committee are appointed by the Town Moderator, with the exception of the three members representing the Selectboard, Northfield Sewer District and Highlands Village District, which are appointed by their respective Boards. The job of the Budget Committee is to review the budgetary recommendations of the governing body and adjust those recommendations as they feel is appropriate for the betterment of the town. It is the Budget Committee's recommendation that you are presented with and asked to vote on at Town Meeting each year. The Budget Committee meets on select Thursday evenings from November through February. The committee is made up of 6 full members and 1 Selectmen's representative.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM COMMITTEE: The CIP Committee develops the annual plan through which the Town proposes purchase of major pieces of equipment and major improvements to town assets such as roads, buildings and parks. This is done as part of the annual budget process, and is presented to the voters at the annual meeting every March. The Committee consists of 7 members, 3 of whom are appointed from the public at large. The remaining members represent the Planning Board, ZBA, Budget Committee and Selectboard. The committee is made up of 3 public members, 1 Selectmen's representative, 1 member from the Budget Committee, 1 member from the Zoning Board, and 1 member from the Planning Board.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION: meet each month on the third Wednesday at 7:00pm at the Town Hall. The Commission's duties are to oversee the usage, maintenance, and properties owned by the Town purchased under conservation. These properties include the conservation areas of Knowles Pond, Richard P Smart, Sotir and Granite Mills. The commission is made up of 5 full members and 2 alternates.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: is a corporation that services Northfield to bring businesses to our community, improved recreation and branding. They are a 501C3 so they can get grants, and donations to help us improve Northfield. (do not need to be a Northfield resident, currently seeking members)

PLANNING BOARD: meet each month the first Monday at 7:00pm here at Town Hall. The Planning Board has a variety of duties under state statutes. The Board is responsible for developing and updating Northfield's master plan, adopting subdivision, site plan review and driveways regulations, developing and proposing zoning ordinance amendments to Northfield's voters and implementing local ordinances through site plan review. The board is made up of a total of 10 members, 6 full member, 1 Selectmen's representative, and 3 alternates.

UPPER MERRIMACK LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE: members meet once a month on 2nd Mondays, from 7-9 p.m. Meeting sites rotate among the towns of Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Franklin, and Northfield. Representatives review permit applications, learn from environmental presenters, draft and manage a corridor management plan, and work to improve conservation related to wetlands, groundwater and shorelands. Join UMLAC and make an impact for clean water and safe habitats. The committee is made up from representative from each town listed above, the Town of Northfield can have up to 4 representatives. ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT: is given broad powers under New Hampshire state statutes. The ZBA is empowered to grant variances to the zoning ordinance under certain circumstances. It can also overrule a decision of the Code Enforcement Officer, and grant 'equitable waivers', or after-the-fact approvals of layout or dimensional requirement violations that have occurred unknowingly. The ZBA meets on the 4th Monday of each month as needed, at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall. The board is made up of 5 full members and 3 alternates.

BACK TO SCHOOL

The school year has begun, and fall is approaching. The Northfield Police Department would like to ask people to be aware of our kids as they walk, ride their bikes and skateboards to and from school. We need to pay extra attention to the speed limits in and around the 2 schools as the speed limit changes in a school zone. From 45 minutes prior to school opening, until each school opens, and from each school closes until 45 minutes after each school closes, the speed limit in those zones are reduced by 10 miles per hour below the usual posted limit.



Also, please watch for school buses slowing, stopping and picking up or dropping off students. When the yellow warning lights on the bus are flashing, this bus is getting ready to stop, when they flash red, kids are either getting on or off the bus.

Some kids have to cross the street once they are off the bus, wait for the bus to shut off their lights and start to move before you go. In addition, please talk to your kids about some basic safety. Walk on the sidewalk, or if there is no sidewalk, not in the road and walk facing traffic.

And always remind them not to talk to or accept rides from strangers, and don't let people into your homes.

IMPORTANT BULLET POINTS FOR DRIVERS:

Did you know the greatest risk to a child is not riding a bus but approaching and exiting one?

- Allow yourself enough time in the morning for your commute.
- Be alert as you back out of a driveway, drive through a neighborhood, school zone or near bus stops.
- Yellow flashing lights on a bus means to slow down, don't speed up.
- Red flashing lights on a bus means STOP wait at least 20 feet behind the bus, remain stopped until the red lights are off and the bus begins to move.
- If you see a bus and the lights are not flashing, watch for children, particularly in the morning or mid-afternoon around school arrival and dismissal times.

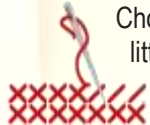
